

SECOS Garden Bird Survey 1985/6

Many thanks for your participation in this survey and the records which you have supplied. It was well supported with 18 members completing the survey on a regular basis. Having finally got all the record sheets in I have attempted the rather daunting task of analysing all the data and presenting the results to you in an easily understood form.

The attached sheets are a method of showing the occurrence of species in each garden during the survey. The figures represent the total number of weeks in which a species was recorded but does not indicate how many of each species occurred. The figure at the top of each column is the number of weeks which observations were carried out for, since not all participants were able to carry out observations for the full 26 weeks.

The commonest bird was easily the blue tit, being recorded in 423 of a possible maximum 426 weeks. The next nine commonest species in order were blackbird, robin, starling, great tit, chaffinch, house sparrow, dunnock, collared dove and greenfinch.

At the other end of the scale nine species were recorded only once in one garden: - common gull, herring gull, heron, corn bunting, moorhen, kestrel, woodcock, chiffchaff and willow warbler, with the willow warbler being seen on the very late date of mid-December. However the rarest species must surely have been the redheaded bunting seen in a Congleton garden for most of March. Although this is an Asian species it is commonly kept as a cage bird and this one is considered to be an escape.

The effects of the freezing weather from end of January through February were not as hard as expected. Some species such as chaffinch showed a slight increase in numbers at the time of the onset of the hard weather and the starving little owl in a Barthomley garden and the woodcock feeding on a Tarporley lawn were also obvious results of these weather conditions. However, most species showed a consistency of numbers which I found surprising.

Other items of interest were the late summer visitors with a chiffchaff in mid-October, a willow warbler in mid-December (overwintering?) and a male blackcap in mid-December and early February (definitely overwintering).

Sparrowhawks were seen in 5 gardens and identified prey included blue tit, house sparrow, male blackbird -taken by a female sparrowhawk- and female blackbird -taken by a male sparrowhawk!

Siskins were recorded in 10 of the 18 gardens. Virtually all of these were recorded first in week 17 or week 18. This coincided with the freezing weather but could al 3 have been related to the exhaustion of their natural food supply.

I have taken this opportunity to send you recording sheets for the coming winter 86/87 in anticipation of you continuing to support this survey. I enclose a list of all participants and registration numbers. Please continue to use the number which you already have, new numbers will only be given to new starters.

Since this is the first year in which we have carried out this survey and presented the results, I would be pleased to receive any comments or suggestions which you may have to improve the organisation.

Once again many thanks for your last winter's efforts and good luck for your next winter's efforts!
