"Crane Spotting" Ashley Grove Friday 8th March

The Lake Hornborga area of Sweden hosts one of the most incredible bird spectacles in Europe, with over 25,000 Common Cranes stopping here to feed on their journey to more northerly breeding grounds. This talk centres around these birds but includes other wildlife that make this area so special to visit in the early spring. All five European grebe species can be seen at this time and top birds like white-tailed eagle, hawfinch and capercaillie are other highlights.

Field Trip Northwich Woodlands Tuesday 12th March

At the SECOS 60th Anniversary Dinner, £63 was collected for **SavingSeabirdsGlobally**. Jeff Clarke would like to thank SECOS members for their generous support.

On 20th February, Jeff handed over £541 from his last 7 talks. Several conservation organisations will benefit, including BirdLife International, BirdLife Marine, Albatross Task Force and Gough Island Restoration.

North Wales Coast - 18th February



21 members travelled to the North Wales Coast, an excellent turnout.

At Llanfairfechan, the weather was calm so it was easy to keep the scopes steady enough for seawatching. Three turnstones probed among the rocks as a few curlew and oystercatchers fed nearby. Several great crested grebes were spotted on the sea. A sudden heavy shower then sent us scurrying for our cars. After a few minutes, we emerged to continue seawatching. A female eider was seen swimming near a derelict groyne. Further out, a flock of common scoters was just about visible in front of Puffin Island. The only gulls were herring and lesser black-backed. Later, a few people spotted red-breasted merganser, red-throated diver, gannet and common guillemot swimming in the sea. We took a short walk up the River Llanfairfechan and were rewarded with good views of goosander (female), dipper (carrying moss for nest building) and grey wagtail.

North Wales (continued)

At The Spinnies, walking up the lane from the car park, greylag goose was added to the day's list. At the small hide, siskins visited the feeder and four common snipe rested on the far bank. A great spotted woodpecker was heard drumming in the distance. At the large beach hide, looking seaward, we added shelduck, goldeneye, pintail, pochard, gadwall, wigeon, little grebe, knot, dunlin, redshank, common gull and great black-backed gull. Looking inland, blue tit, great tit, coal tit, goldcrest, nuthatch, goldfinch, chaffinch, robin and wren were seen/heard at the feeding station and nearby.

At Penmaen-bach Point, a fulmar was seen flying around the tunnel entrance on the A55.

At RSPB Conwy, a few members took a welcome break in the new café, but most headed straight onto the reserve. At the feeding station, there were long-tailed tits. Shoveler, tufted duck and teal were added to the day's list of ducks. There were singles of little egret and meadow pipit, together with a small flock of pied wagtails. Cetti's warbler and greenfinch were heard. Our first raptors of the day were a peregrine, three circling common buzzards and a sparrowhawk being mobbed by corvids. The estuary was quiet, none of the expected shelduck and just a few oystercatchers. A nice non-avian species was an early common toad.

A few members stopped at Llanddulas on the way home and saw gannet, red-throated diver, red-breasted merganser, 30+ scoters, and a male and female eider. A great end to the day! An impressive 73 species were seen/heard during the trip.
