# **Field Trip** Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> April Macclesfield Forest & Tegg's Nose



Macclesfield Forest is the last substantial remnant of a vast Norman royal hunting forest. It provides diverse habitats that support a variety of bird species. Notably, Trentabank Reservoir hosts the largest

heronry in the Peak District. Adjacent to the forest, Tegg's Nose features a mix of moorland, meadows, and broadleaved woodland. Elevated vantage points offer panoramic views across the Cheshire Plain and towards the Peak District.

# Long Weekend Trip Norfolk Fri 25<sup>th</sup> - Mon 28<sup>th</sup> April

We're heading to Norfolk in April for our long weekend trip, staying at the Le Strange Arms in Old Hunstanton. Norfolk is one of the UK's top birding destinations, offering a rich variety of habitats, from coastal marshes to heathland and ancient woodlands. We'll explore renowned reserves along the North Norfolk coast and venture inland to key sites near the Norfolk-Suffolk border. Expect a fantastic mix of waders, wildfowl, raptors, and woodland species. With migration in full swing, there's plenty of potential for exciting sightings throughout the trip. # Doxey Marshes - 4<sup>th</sup> March

### Burton Mere Wetlands - 16<sup>th</sup> March

On a beautiful spring day, 21 members travelled to RSPB Burton Mere Wetlands.

#### **Arrival & First Sightings**

As we assembled in the car park, a pair of nuthatches darted through the trees, while a chiffchaff sang its familiar melody. A treecreeper was spotted, joined by blue tits and great tits flitting about the branches. A particularly bold robin perched on one of our scopes, allowing for close-up phone photos – an early highlight of the day!

At the visitor centre, sharp-eyed members spotted a kingfisher resting on the far bank of Willow Pool. This former fishery still contains plenty of fish, ensuring a reliable food source for these dazzling birds.

#### **Reception Hide: A Busy Scrape**

At Reception Hide, overlooking the main scrape known as Reception Pool, we were treated to a lively mix of ducks and waders. Teal, mallard, shoveler, shelduck and gadwall dabbled in the water, while avocets, lapwings, redshank and a lone oystercatcher foraged. A little grebe surfaced close to the hide, diving frequently. A male marsh harrier quartered the reedbed in search of prey, while a grey heron stood statue-like in a distant field.

#### **Reedbed Screen & Heronry**

Following the Burton Mere Trail, we passed Willow Pool and Woodland Pool, where longtailed tits flitted through the trees and a pair of tufted ducks was seen.

Hoping for a glimpse of elusive wetland birds, we stopped at the Reedbed Screen. Unfortunately, bittern and water rail remained hidden, only a single greylag goose was seen. Further along the trail, we watched grey herons bringing nesting material to the heronry – an impressive spectacle.





### Burton Mere Wetlands (continued)



#### Marsh Covert Hide overlooking Reedbed Pool and Bridge Pool

At Marsh Covert Hide, a Cetti's warbler flew across a channel and disappeared into the reeds, while gadwall, tufted duck and a single shoveler lingered on Reedbed Pool. Over at Bridge Pool, three black-tailed godwits waded, and a squadron of twenty grey herons flew in.

Nearby, a Cetti's warbler called from the reeds, and a Raven flew over calling 'korrp' to confirm its identity.

#### Bridge Screen overlooking Bridge Pool

A single male pintail was sleeping on the bank at the back of the pool, occasionally standing to give us a better view. Four black-tailed godwits flew over.

We followed the Farm and Willow Trail, winding through peaceful alder and willow woodland. A kestrel was spotted on the way.

#### **Border Hide: A Recent Addition**

Border Hide, a newish feature of the reserve (opened in 2021), provided excellent views over Centenary Pool and Border Pool. We watched avocets and black-tailed godwits feeding, revealing their white wing bars as they moved between sections of the pool. A few wigeon rested on the near bank. Teal, in their full breeding plumage, showed off their vibrant colours, while a lone knot preened nearby. A little egret was added to the day's list. A buzzard soared overhead, and a sparrowhawk was spotted perched in a tree.

#### **Burton Point: Sweeping Estuary Views**

Retracing our steps, we climbed the Hillfort Trail to Burton Point, where we were rewarded with stunning panoramic views across the Dee Estuary. A great spotted woodpecker drummed in the trees, while hundreds of pink-footed geese grazed on the marsh below. Two great white egrets were a welcome addition to our list.

#### **Bunker Hide & Final Sightings**

Returning to the visitor centre, we made our way to Bunker Hide. A green woodpecker announced its presence with a distinctive yaffling call. A flock of barnacle geese dropped into a field beyond the reedbed, and a female marsh harrier was seen hunting. A reed bunting appeared briefly, while a greenfinch perched at the top of a nearby tree.

Back at the visitor centre, a male stonechat posed perfectly on a post - our last sighting of the day.

#### A Wonderful Day Out

With the sun shining and plenty of bird activity, we had an excellent day at Burton Mere Wetlands. Many thanks to Anthea Gater for leading the trip!
