## Field Trip Goyt Valley Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> May

Goyt Valley is located a few miles to the northwest of Buxton. The valley has two big drinking-water reservoirs called Fernilee and Errwood. They are both fed by the River Goyt and provide drinking water for Stockport and its surrounding areas. The Valley is rich in wildlife and May is an ideal time to visit when the spring migrants have returned.

# Summer Walk Astbury Mere Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> May

Astbury Mere has a rich history dating back to the 18<sup>th</sup> century. Formerly, silica sand was quarried on the site. In the 1970s, the lake and surrounding parkland were purchased by the local council and transformed into a public park. Today, the area forms a shallow bowl, centred on Astbury Mere, with surrounding grassland, woodland and plantation.



## Field Trip RSPB Old Moor Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> May

RSPB Old Moor lies in the heart of Yorkshire's Dearne Valley In May, the reserve comes alive with the sounds and colours of nature. The lush greenery of the wetlands is dotted with vibrant wildflowers, creating a stunning backdrop for the busy birdlife. The reedbeds and muddy scrapes are home to some of the UK's rarest birds such as avocets, bitterns and marsh harriers.

Nine members met at the gate on Thelwall Lane to gain access to the road up to Woolston Eyes No. 3 Bed. As we were getting ready in the small car park, a call came from three more members who couldn't find the access road but Mike came to their rescue in Lidl's car park and we were soon setting off across the locked bridge onto the reserve. Working our way to The John Morgan Hide, hearing chiffchaffs, robins and dunnocks sing, we picked up the usual Canada and greylag geese, black-headed gulls, tufted ducks and plenty of gadwall on No.3 bed. A great spotted woodpecker was busy taking seed from the feeders, a marsh harrier was seen over the reedbed and sand martins were plentiful, hawking insects over the water. To our surprise no black-necked grebes were visible but the Woolston Eyes Recorder told us they were further along the track, visible from the Warrington Rotary Hide. After a short walk we found the hide and a couple of black-necked grebes were soon found up against the reeds just coming into their full breeding plumage.

## Woolston Eyes (continued)

As lunchtime was approaching, we walked back to the cars through the wildflower meadows laid down to feed finches over the winter. After lunch, we drove down to the next car park by No. 4 Bed, a new area recently opened to Woolston Eyes members, which is a linear walk to a hide and viewing platform. We didn't walk all the way to the hide but stopped to overlook the large reedbed and water. Several mute swans and other wildfowl were present along with oystercatcher, lapwing and more black-headed gulls, and one sharp-eyed ex-chairman spotted a kingfisher flying across the water. On the walk back we heard, for some, our first willow warblers of the year and then we found one moving around in the trees.

A £5 per person permit fee was collected from non-WECG members and £45 has been sent to WECG. Thank you for your support.

In total, we saw 44 species which are listed below:

Greylag goose, Canada goose, Mute swan, Common shelduck, Shoveler, Gadwall, Mallard, Teal, Common pochard, Tufted duck, Common pheasant, Little grebe, Great crested grebe, Black-necked grebe, Woodpigeon, Moorhen, Coot, Oystercatcher, Lapwing, Black-headed gull, Lesser black-backed gull, Cormorant, Grey heron, Little egret, Marsh harrier, Common buzzard, Kingfisher, Great spotted woodpecker, Kestrel, Jay, Magpie, Carrion crow, Blue tit, Great tit, Sand martin, Blackcap, Willow warbler, Chiffchaff, Cetti's warbler, Wren, Robin, Dunnock, Greenfinch, Reed bunting.
