May 2024 Field Trip Goyt Valley Tuesday 7th May

Goyt Valley is located a few miles to the northwest of Buxton. The valley has two big drinking-water reservoirs called Fernilee and Errwood. They are both fed by the River Goyt and provide drinking water for Stockport and its surrounding areas. The Valley is rich in wildlife and May is an ideal time to visit when the spring migrants have returned.





Evening Walk Fanny's Croft, Alsager Wednesday 15th May

This pleasant countryside walk is around the farmland to the south of Alsager, and includes a small wooded area known as The Sprink. Meet at 7.00 p.m.

Field Trip Burton Mere Wetlands Sunday 19th May

Situated in the Dee Estuary, Burton Mere Wetlands straddles the border between northeast Wales and Cheshire. It has a mosaic of reedbeds, marshland, scrapes, lagoons and ponds, narrow strips of woodland and mixed farmland. In spring, the reserve is alive with the sights and sounds of breeding birds.

A Tribute to Patrick Whalley

We were saddened to hear the news that one of our Society's founding members, Patrick Whalley, had passed away aged 85.

In his early years, Patrick was a keen and skilful birder and, as well as recording local birds, he was licensed by the BTO as a bird ringer. He was instrumental in getting the Sandbach Flashes designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest in 1963.

In 1964, Patrick and Alan Goodin, a good friend and local birder, decided to form a local bird club based at Sandbach and so SECOS was founded. Patrick served on the committee as Recorder from 1964 to 1979, and produced the first "Checklist of the Birds of Sandbach Flashes".

During the 1960s, Patrick and others erected a bird hide at Doddington Pool, at the request of the headmistress of Goudhurst College girls' school (which occupied Doddington Hall). The headmistress was keen for the girls to widen their interests.

Patrick was an accomplished artist. He designed the first SECOS logo of a little ringed plover and some of his designs were used by the RSPB on their Christmas cards.

In 2000, Patrick was appointed an Honorary Life Member in recognition of his work for SECOS. Patrick laid firm foundations for the Society, which is still thriving 60 years later.

Woolston Eyes - 2nd April

15 members travelled the short distance to Woolston Eyes NR. The

weather was fine and dry. In the morning, we visited each of the hides on No. 3 Bed. In the afternoon, we followed the track through No 4 bed.

43 bird species were recorded including gadwall, pochard, little grebe, black-necked grebe, sparrowhawk, marsh harrier, blackcap and brambling.

In the days leading up to the trip and afterwards, two garganey, two ferruginous ducks and a ruddy duck were reported on the reserve. Unfortunately, we didn't see any of them!

19 people travelled to RSPB Lake Vyrnwy. The weather was dry with

sunny intervals throughout the day.

On the approach to the reserve, a goshawk was spotted.

In the morning, most people chose to follow the 3-mile Wildlife Trail (Blue Trail) in a clockwise direction. A few people opted to take the 2-mile Wildlife Way (Yellow Trail) and explore the area below the dam wall. The trails were mostly undulating coarse-gravelled forestry tracks. There was one steep ascent on the Wildlife Trail, which everyone managed. If we visit in future, it may be better to avoid the steep ascent by walking the trail in an anti-clockwise direction.

On the Wildlife Trail, we recorded tits (marsh (heard), willow, great, blue and coal), thrushes (song, mistle, blackbird), warblers (wood warbler, chiffchaff, willow warbler, blackcap), raptors (buzzard, red kite), nuthatch, redstart, pied flycatcher, common crossbill, brambling, siskin, skylark, dunnock and raven. Willow warblers vastly outnumbered chiffchaffs. We watched a probable tree pipit perched at the top of a tree. After a while, it climbed into the air and then parachuted to the top of a nearby tree. A few minutes later, it repeated this behaviour to confirm its identity.

At the Coed y Capel Hide and around the visitor centre, siskin, marsh/willow tit and collared dove were seen. A small flock of house martins flew through.

Around the dam, crows (carrion crow, jackdaw, magpie), swallow, treecreeper and chaffinch were recorded.





Lake Vyrnwy RSPB (continued)

After lunch, we drove about 5 miles to Rhiwargor car park at the top of the lake and walked the 2-mile Waterfall Trail (Green Trail). Part of the trail was closed for forestry work, making it an 'out and back' walk rather than a circular walk. The trail was mostly an undulating stone footpath with no steep parts. Several chiffchaffs were heard. A flock of small brown birds, believed to be meadow pipit, landed and were soon hidden in the grass. A distant cuckoo was spotted perched quietly in a small tree at the top of the waterfall. A redstart was seen on the way back to the car park.

Some people continued to the Centenary Hide where roadside parking was limited. The hide was accessed via a 350-metre track through woodland. Mandarin duck and Canada goose were in the pool. A peregrine was spotted perched on a distant rock face. The woodland around the hide was very productive with treecreeper, goldcrest, whitethroat, chiffchaff, willow warbler, chaffinch, redstart, pied flycatcher, blue tit and great tit. A great spotted woodpecker was heard drumming and a raven flew over.

Some people continued a further 800 metres along the road to the Lakeside Hide where great crested grebe, mallard and kestrel were added to the day's list.

A few people opted to travel to Llangynog. They were rewarded for climbing more hills with stonechat, redstart, peregrine, goldfinch and jackdaw.

A most enjoyable day with the target birds of the western oak woodlands – pied flycatcher, redstart, wood warbler, crossbill and goshawk – all recorded, and the cuckoo a bonus. A total of 50 species were seen/heard.
