
Field Trip RSPB Leighton Moss Sunday 11th May

Nestled near Silverdale on the fringes of Morecambe Bay, Leighton Moss boasts the largest expanse of reedbeds in northwest England. Its wetlands, reedbeds and woodland support an array of wildlife, including bearded tits, marsh harriers, bitterns, otters, and red deer. Several trails

wind through the reserve, leading to 7 hides and the 9-metre-high Skytower.



Field Trip Goyt Valley Tuesday 20th May

Situated a few miles northwest of Buxton, the Goyt Valley is a renowned for its rich industrial heritage and diverse wildlife. In May, the valley oakwoods come alive with bird migrants, including pied flycatcher, redstart and willow warbler; and ring ouzel breed on the moorlands.

Summer Walk

Biddulph Grange - Wednesday 28th May



Join us for a scenic walk through Biddulph Grange's rich landscapes. Our route includes The Clough, the tranquil Baileys Wood (a Woodland Trust reserve), and a stretch of the Biddulph Valley Way. We'll also explore Biddulph Grange Country Park, a 73-acre haven of woodlands, meadows, and a Victorian-era lake with a

restored stone boathouse. Expect a delightful mix of natural beauty and historical charm - perfect for birdwatching and a peaceful summer walk.

Macclesfield Forest & Bottoms Reservoir, Langley 8th April



On a bright and warm spring morning, 18 members met by the Visitor Centre at Trentabank Reservoir in Macclesfield Forest. The water level in the reservoir was low but disappointingly we didn't see any waders taking advantage of the exposed mud. The heronry in the trees opposite the viewing point now has mainly cormorants nesting with just a few grey herons visible. On the water mandarin ducks were swimming up an inlet together with several noisy Canada geese,

We took the trail towards Shutlingsloe, an uphill walk with steep climbs in places to the accompaniment of chiffchaffs, song thrushes, blackbirds, great tits and coal tits. Willow warblers were soon heard together with chiffchaff and several tit species (great, blue, coal and long-tailed). A welcome seat brought a stop where goldcrests were heard and seen moving across the trail followed by chaffinches.

As Shutlingsloe came into view, we took the trail to the right and after a short uphill climb the path opened out to give beautiful views over the forest. Here we watched four or possibly five common buzzards soaring on the thermals in the distance. After some refreshments we started the walk back down to the Visitor Centre, with a possible crossbill sighting. The willow warblers and chiffchaffs continued to sing together with the blue, great and coal tits. At another stopping point a robin, dunnock and wren were added to the day list. On reaching the car park, some elected to take lunch while others set off for Bottom's Reservoir in Langley.

The afternoon was a linear walk along the road in front of Bottom's Reservoir. No hirundines were seen feeding over the water or grey wagtails in the culvert but the water level was low and the weeds growing in the wall suggested it had been like this for a while. We did see a coot and tufted ducks.

Walking along the road, it seemed we were too early for pied flycatchers or common redstarts although a few reports were starting to come into BirdGuides of their arrival in Derbyshire. Willow warblers and chiffchaffs were again heard and seen together with a nesting treecreeper. A nuthatch was calling but despite all efforts could not be found. Common buzzard continued to soar over Tegg's Nose and a green woodpecker could be heard yaffling. A brown hare was spotted in a field with brimstone and orange tip butterflies observed on the wing. As we returned along the same route, the mandarin ducks were seen on Tegg's Nose Reservoir, really close to the bank for the photographers.

Canada goose, tufted duck, mallard, Mandarin duck, coot, lapwing, common pheasant, woodpigeon, common buzzard, stock dove, green woodpecker (heard), blue tit, chiffchaff, blackcap (heard), goldfinch, carrion crow, treecreeper, nuthatch (heard). magpie, jackdaw, rook, raven

Plus a red kite was seen in the morning on the approach road to the forest.
