Field Trip Pennington Flash Tuesday 7th October

Pennington Flash, near Warrington, is one of the northwest's top birding sites. The 70-hectare lake was formed in the early 20th century by mining subsidence from Bickershaw Colliery and now sits within a 200-hectare country park. Over 230 bird species have been recorded, including osprey, kingfisher, marsh harrier and spoonbill. The reserve features accessible paths, bird hides and varied habitats including open water, reedbeds and woodland.

"The Ascent of Birds: How Modern Science Is Revealing Their Story" Professor John Reilly Friday 10th October



When and where did the ancestors of modern birds evolve? What enabled them to survive the meteoric impact that wiped out the dinosaurs? How did these early birds spread across the globe and give rise to the 10,600-plus species we recognise today? Based on the latest scientific discoveries and enriched by personal observations, this talk sets out to answer these fundamental questions.

Field Trip Wirral Sunday 26th October

We travel to the Wirral, where we'll visit premier birdwatching hotspots including Parkgate, Thurstaston Beach, Hoylake and Leasowe. Our day begins at Parkgate salt marsh, a sweeping



wetland of international importance, hosting vast numbers of waders and wildfowl.

Marshside & Hesketh Out Marsh 28th September



Twenty-two members attended our first trip of the new SECOS season, held in fine autumn weather with sunny intervals, a gentle breeze, and temperatures of 13-15°C.

Marshside

On arrival at Marshside RSPB, a skein of pink-footed geese flew in 'V' formation over the car park – a promising start to the day.

A brief stop at the gate viewpoint produced gadwall, mallard, shoveler, moorhen, cormorant, grey heron, lapwing and pied wagtail. From Sandgrounders' Hide we had excellent views across Sandgrounders' Pool and Polly's Pool, adding Canada goose, greylag goose, shelduck, wigeon, teal, coot, herring gull and lesser black-backed gull. Two female pintails showed well close to the hide, and a great black-backed gull stood out in the sunshine. Two redshank were feeding and a single black-tailed godwit dropped in. A flock of meadow pipits were feeding across the grassland. A Cetti's warbler gave itself away with its loud song. Raptors were also active: a kestrel hunted over the marsh and another perched on a post, while a peregrine caused a commotion among the geese. On Crossens Marsh, a distant flock of golden plover gathered, and a few members were lucky enough to spot a cattle egret.

At Junction Pool, a single snipe was found, along with a black swan. A stonechat also showed near the viewpoint. At Nel's Hide, there were hundreds of resting black-tailed godwits, occasionally stretching to reveal their white wing bars. Waders here also included a ruff and three curlew sandpipers. There was a common gull at Fairclough's Viewpoint. On the marsh, on the opposite side of the road to the visitor centre, cattle egret, reed bunting, skylark and merlin were recorded. At Marine Pool, off Marine Drive, mute swan, little grebe and great crested grebe were added to the day's list.

Hesketh Out Marsh

In the afternoon we travelled the short distance to Hesketh Out Marsh RSPB, carefully negotiating the mile-long potholed track to the car park. From Karen's Viewpoint on the west seawall, we enjoyed superb elevated views across the marsh and the Ribble Estuary.

A greenshank and two redshank foraged close by, while a curlew sandpiper fed along the muddy margin and a curlew worked the far bank. Ruff were present in good numbers. Little egrets were scattered across the pools, joined briefly by a great white egret.

Two marsh harriers quartered the marsh, three buzzards circled overhead, and amongst a group of resting redshank we picked out a spotted redshank, its longer legs and bill pattern confirming the identification.

A few members walked onto the north bank, where a peregrine gave a final flourish to the day's sightings.

With many species recorded, fine weather, and good company, this was a thoroughly enjoyable start to the season.
