Chelford Sand Quarries - 4th November

17 members attended on a damp but rewarding day. In the morning, we explored Mere Farm Quarries North, South and East. In the afternoon, we visited Acre Nook Quarry, Parklands Mere and Lapwing Hall Pool.



42 bird species were recorded: Canada goose, pink-footed goose, mute swan, shoveler, gadwall, wigeon, mallard, teal, pochard, tufted duck, goldeneye, pheasant, woodpigeon, moorhen, coot, little grebe, great crested grebe, lapwing, black-headed gull, lesser black-backed gull, cormorant, great white egret, sparrowhawk, buzzard, kestrel, great spotted woodpecker, jay, magpie, carrion crow, blue tit, great tit, long-tailed tit, Cetti's warbler, starling, blackbird, tree sparrow, dunnock, robin, pied wagtail, chaffinch, goldfinch, siskin

Carsington Water - 23rd November



Twelve members enjoyed a visit to Carsington Water, enjoying sunny intervals throughout the day. With the reservoir sitting at around 50% capacity, large grassed areas were exposed around the edges – a striking sight, but one that resulted in noticeably fewer water birds than usual and not a single wader.

Our first stop was the **Paul Stanley Hide**, reached via a short woodland walk where bullfinch and chaffinch were noted. From the hide, the very low water level was evident. Only a handful of water birds were present: a few mallards and cormorants, plus a single little grebe. Two distant red kites drifted around. The return walk through the woodland provided treecreeper, goldcrest, blue tit and goldfinch.

At the **Sheepwash Hide**, the range of species improved. We recorded a few goldeneye, wigeon, gadwall, tufted duck, great crested grebe and good numbers of teal. A single pochard was seen – a stark contrast to our 15th December 2024 visit when over 200 pochard were present, with an impressive 924 on 10th December 2024. Black-headed gulls and lesser black-backed gulls were also noted. Around 30 meadow pipits and eight pied wagtails were actively foraging on the grass at the water's edge, and a low-flying kestrel gave a brief but welcome appearance.

A stop at the **Visitor Centre** added dunnock, robin and house sparrow to our list.

En route to the **Wildlife Centre**, small numbers of coot and Canada geese were seen, and a flock of around 50 goldfinches passed overhead. Very few birds were visible from the hide itself and, with no food on the feeders, activity was limited. However, a single redwing perched prominently at the top of a tree across the water.

Carsington Water (continued)

Our final stop, **Stones Island**, offered decent numbers of greylag geese and lesser black-backed gulls on the water. A lone oystercatcher was seen among the moored boats.

Some members rounded off the outing with a well-earned hot drink in the café.


